



Olivia Newton-John was a beloved singer, actress, and cultural icon whose career spanned decades. She passed away in 2022 (not 2021) at the age of 73, prompting an outpouring of tributes from fans and fellow artists. Today, Olivia Newton-John is remembered not only for her

music and film career but also for her resilience, kindness, and enduring influence on
