Internationally, he has highlighted places such as Bowery Ballroom for its close-knit crowd experience, and The Metro, celebrated for its history and vibrant audiences.



These venues reflect his preference for spaces where audience interaction feels immediate and authentic rather than distant or overly commercial. Whether performing at home in London or abroad, Professor Green values environments that amplify the emotional honesty at the core of his music. His journey—from early
